NOTES FROM THE OVAL OPHICLEIDE

In my conversations with clergy of various denominations, two questions that I often hear are: "Where are the new organists coming from?" or "How can we help to continue the legacy of organ playing in our churches?" One answer may surprise you; the church may actually have a few candidates seated in their congregation and not even know it. The following is a short list of simple things that we all can do to help shine a bright and positive light on the organ.

Leave the organ up and running for a few minutes after your Sunday postlude, just in case you get some visitors. Post a notice in the bulletin inviting people to come visit the organ. Then welcome them and encourage them to come back sometime with friends and young people. We were all once that curious youngster yearning to see the musical magic that was coming from the organ.

Unlock the console and throw away the key. YES!-Leave the roll top unlocked. Refuse to invoke the "don't touch" rule. Consoles are too beautiful to be locked up in choir lofts. And their seduction potential is too great not to explore with as many people as we can. If you're concerned about damage, post some house rules on the music rack and expect people to be as respectful as you would be with their instruments.

Take pride in the organ you play. Even if you hate it, it is your congregation's instrument, and they have entrusted you with the task of taking care of it. You may find that a clean console may engender increased pride and focus for you and therefore enhanced worship for all.

Have a time of console cleaning following church or after children's choir rehearsal. Invite kids to come and assist with dusting, vacuuming under the pedalboard, removing clutter, etc. Offer a small gift or snack as an incentive to help. They may even want a chance to sit down and play some keys.

Place announcements of the AGO events and concerts in your church's newsletter or bulletin. Invite the congregation to our chapter's open events. Particularly the Family Concert on Sunday-February 26th at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Bowling Green.

Invent your own, additional ways beyond these to keep the organ a viable part of your congregation's life. Playing it well, taking care of it, and providing opportunities for everyone to enjoy it will be a wonderful recruiting tool for our next generation of organists.


A Family Organ Pops Concert Sunday, February 26, 2012 4:00 p.m. St. Mark's Lutheran Church

Member Review of Blizzard Anthems:

Doug McConnell, director Joan McConnell, accompanist January 23, Sylvania United Church of Christ, Sally Mossing, host

Over two dozen enthusiastic people sang "instant anthems" from The New Century Hymnal, Pilgrim Press, 1995. The hymnal has 617 hymns, some with call and response or interrupting refrains that actually are already anthems: for instance, TNCH 616, I Want to Be Ready. In addition to hymns, TNCH has psalms, service music, canticles and ancient songs.

You need instant anthems; bad weather or a small choir are two reasons. It is an educational and challenging way to introduce new hymns or present familiar hymns with a new twist to choir and congregation. The music is good and shorter rehearsals allows more time to be devoted to other pieces on the schedule that need more significant rehearsal time. The contrast in musical styles helps to keep singers engaged as they learn. Budgets aren't growing, and you already have hymnals at your fingertips. A few general ideas: rubato, fermatas, a cappella, four parts, three parts, two parts, unison, coda, change tempo of a verse, interludes, descants, non-melody voices hum or sing "loo" or "low" on their vocal lines.

TNCH 108: Isaiah the Prophet

Sing unison, vary the voice appointments, and add additional melody instruments. Use/DON'T use the accompaniment

TNCH: 322: Take me to the Water

11 measures, about 12 seconds per stanza - Use Stanza 1 as a Refrain, not just as Stanza one

Doug McConnell is a composer. For #108, we used his duet arrangements (one part demonstrated on recorder by Joan). For #322, we sang his expanded vocal arrangement.

PIPEDREAMS...

a weekly program that highlights the art of the pipe organ, turns 30 this year. From tentative beginnings as a 14-week 'exploratory pilot series', PIPEDREAMS has evolved into an ongoing, internationally acknowledged resource enjoyed by an audience of several hundred thousand avid radio listeners and website visitors to pipedreams.org. Now beginning its fourth decade, PIPEDREAMS persists as the only, and longest-lived nationally syndicated radio program devoted to organ music.

A wide variety of listener-friendly music will exploit the sonic possibilities of the magnificent 108-rank Casavant-Schantz pipe organ, which many consider to be among the finest concert organs in the Midwest.

Some PIPEDREAMS background ...

When the American Guild of Organists held a national convention in the Twin Cities in 1980, Michael Barone, at that time classical music director of Minnesota Public Radio, made arrangements to record virtually all of the convention concerts. The MPR schedule already included a weekly broadcast, The Organ Program, a show for which Barone had been host/producer since 1970, and this could have been the obvious outlet for the AGO materials. But Barone felt that the convention concerts were worthy of national distribution. With a canny suggestion in naming the show from then-MPR Program Director Nicholas D. Nash, the idea for PIPEDREAMS was born, and it debuted as a discrete 14-show 'special offering' beginning January 3, 1982, temporarily replacing The Organ Program in PIPEDREAMS aired the MPR schedule. nationally on 64 stations. Following this initial 'pilot' offering, an ongoing strategy was formulated, and PIPEDREAMS returned in October 1983 as a regular, weekly program, continuing in that mode every since and at present broadcast by 132 stations around the country, including in six of the top-ten markets. At 30 years, American Public Media's PIPEDREAMS has outlasted any previous national 'organ program'...including The Auditorium Organ with John Obetz (28 years in syndication) and the famed live CBS broadcasts by E. Power Biggs from the Germanic Museum at Harvard University (16 years).
