From the Dean

Dear friends,

I have just finished formatting the program information for our 2013-14 AGO season. It is VERY impressive! I hope you will read it carefully and mark all the dates on your calendar. Your Executive Committee worked hard to plan a variety of events, some for learning, some for fun, many for food, ALL for fellowship with friends and colleagues who share our love for the organ and for church music. Please thank them when you see them.

Speaking of the Executive Committee, I have the RESULTS from our June election. The newest members of the committee, term ending spring 2016, are Dennis Johns, Denise Mathias, and Kathy Rupp. You will notice that they are already very involved in leadership; we welcome them and thank them!

I am excited about all of our events, so let me just gush for a few moments. In an effort to provide practical instructive events, we are having a choral reading session, a service-playing program, a hand bell reading and techniques session, an organ Master Class and lecture, and a field trip to Detroit.

We believe it's good to hear music played well by people who are skilled performers. To that end we are hosting guest artist Anthony Williams, University Organist and Associate Professor of Music at Fisk University, Nashville, and promoting a recital by Paul Jacobs of Juilliard. I met some great folks, including young people; there were 30 students registered for the event! We got to know some of the kids who competed in the RCYO, including the winner, Nick Quardokus. On Wednesday a few more of our folks turned up in Battle Creek: Randy and Margaret Currie and Kathy Mumy.

Highlights of the convention: We always enjoy the recitals and the wide range of repertoire that we hear. The workshops too provided variety: practical topics like service playing, organ pedagogy, hand bells with organ, and choral techniques were at the top of our list. I enjoyed Paul Barte's presentation of "Bach Myths" and Brooks Grantier's well-researched talk on the connection between W.K. Kellogg and the Skinner organ company. Our own Pam Stover led a helpful workshop on professional concerns. Possibly the experience that topped everything was the Choral Academy, led by Dr. Joe Miller of Westminster Choir College. Several of us got to sing in that group, and can share with you what a wonderful rehearsal and performance opportunity that was.

I've gone on long enough, so let me just say WELCOME to another great year of AGO programming. I look forward to seeing each of you at our events!

GARRETT LAW PERFORMS AT CATHEDRAL



TOLEDO OHIO — On Tuesday, June 11, Toledo native Garrett Law gave his Senior Recital at Rosary Cathedral in Toledo. Garrett has been playing piano since the age of 10. He started his organ lessons at the age of 12. He is now 18. He was always fascinated at the organ for its sounds and expression, more than the piano can offer. His first organ teacher was a big influence on him as he presented the organ in a way that excited Garrett. In his sophomore year at Central Catholic High School, he auditioned at Interlochen Arts Academy and got accepted. He spent three years there and graduated this spring. He will be attending Cleveland Institute of Music this fall, studying for his Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance, under Todd Wilson, also a Toledo native. Garrett

is a regular at the Cathedral as he played all of Central Catholic's School Masses on the church's 75 rank 4 manual Skinner Pipe Organ. "It means a lot to me to be able to play my Senior Recital here at the Cathedral. A lot of my friends haven't heard me since I left for school, so this is my way of showing them how much I've improved." The Toledo Chapter of the AGO has helped him in his studying of the organ. "I auditioned for the AGO Scholarship Program and won. This enabled me to pay for organ lessons as well as continuing to take piano lessons. It was very expensive to take both lessons, so the AGO really made it all possible with the scholarship. I also attended "Pedals, Pipes and Pizza," and found many kids my own age that were also interested in the organ. I thought I was the only one." After college Garrett wants to continue his study in organ performance. "I would love to be the music director of a Cathedral some day. I would like to study choral directing too, as I love the sound of a choir."

Here is Garrett's recital program:

- 1. Prelude and Fugue in B Major, Op. 7, No. 1 Marcel Dupre. Garrett had control of this piece from the first note struck on the keyboard. It was flashy, flawless and technically perfect.
- 2. *Prelude, Fugue and Variation, Op. 18* Cesar Franck. This piece was beautifully registered as it sounded smooth, soothing, lyrical and lovely.
- 3. Trio Sonata in C Major, BWV 529 J.S. Bach. To quote Virgil Fox, "As I play this Sonata, if you keep track of all three voices, you're going to be busy. As I play it, I'm going to be busy-er." The organ registrations chosen by Garrett sparkled as his fingers and feet glided effortlessly over the keys and pedals.
- 4. Symphonie No. 10 "Romane" Op. 73, III Cantilene Charles-Marie Widor. Garrett's interpretation of this movement was mysterious, haunting and colorful.
- 5. Symphonie No. 1, Op. 14, VI Final Louis Vierne. A fitting finale to a fantastic performance. Fast, loud and furious, as the excitement builds in this piece. Garrett received a rousing standing ovation with shouts of "bravo" from all who attended, with two curtain calls. This author was hoping for an encore, but I guess we'll have to wait for Garrett's next concert. Garrett Law is a talent to look out for. His mastery of the organ and the interpretation of its literature is years ahead in scope. Any Cathedral who hires Mr. Law will have a gem of a musician at its king of instruments.

KEISER HONORED AT NYC GALA

NEW YORK CITY — The American Guild of Organists presented its tenth annual Recital and Gala Benefit Reception on Friday, April 5, at St. John the Divine in New York City. An estimated audience of 300 colleagues, students, and friends came together to celebrate the lifetime achievements of Marilyn Keiser. Dr. Keiser was given the AGO Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award. The event raised approximately \$40,000 to be invested in the AGO Endowment Fund in Marilyn Keiser's honor.

The recital, which was played by Marilyn Keiser on the Cathedral's Great Organ, included works by Alec Wyton, Herbert Howells, Josef Rheinberger, Dan Locklair, Mark Jones, Robert Powell, Margaret Vardell Sandresky, Olivier Messiaen, and Louis Vierne. Composers Locklair and Jones were in attendance at the recital.

Established in 1994, the AGO Endowment Fund provides income to expand programs for leadership development among AGO members, educate new organists; and cultivate new audiences for organ and choral music. Tax-deductible contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested in perpetuity to produce continuing income for essential Guild programs and educational projects.



Please **do not** call the church to arrange this time, as Pam Davis will schedule this with you.





An additional interest has been movement and ease in playing; she and her husband Thom Miles, both certified Andover Educators, present workshops on Body Mapping, and on the topic What Every Organist Needs to Know about the Body. Her CD of Liszt and Reubke appeared on the Arsis label in 2001, followed by one of César Franck in 2005. A recording of Bach's Art of Fugue, performed on the Brombaugh organ at First Presbyterian Church in Springfield, Illinois, was released in 2008.
