The Toledo Chapter Officers and Board members met via ZOOM on August 10. A portion of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of programming during the current COVID-19 pandemic. It was decided that in person meetings should not be held until at least until early next year. The Chapter will make an effort to keep connected with members through the newsletter and online programs.

The first effort will be a virtual organ crawl that will feature several members demonstrating the organs they play each week. It is hoped that

this will be ready by October and will be available on our newly created Toledo Chapter YouTube channel. It is possible that our scholarship students who did not have an opportunity to perform last March may be included in this program.

Instead of in person meetings designed to educate and develop skills we encourage members to access the numerous educational videos available on the AGO National website. Did you attend the AGO OrganFest this past July? It was an easy journey from the kitchen with a cold beverage to the couch in front of the TV! While the AGO Atlanta Chapter was unable to host an in person National Convention this year, Michael Velting and his committee provided a phenomenal week of concerts and educational videos. The concerts by some of our top performers were played on prestigious organs anywhere from New York City to Atlanta to Paris, France and places in between. While there is nothing like attending a performance in person, the audio-video production was excellent. It was also great to see the performers up close – better than front row seats.

Each night's program was between 45-60 minutes and included several performances as well as some brief updates about Guild activities from National Council members. Chelsea Chen led interesting interviews with the composer whose works were performed that evening.

In addition to the featured events each evening, additional

performances by the Rising Stars from the 2019 Quimby regional competitions can be viewed. And there is a lengthy list of educational "Pipe Talk" videos on many subjects (think Convention 'Breakout' sessions. Most are brief, 10-15 minutes).

## **Ohio Guidelines for Concerts**

Governor DeWine has established guidelines for indoor and outdoor entertainment (concert) venues. Attendance at indoor venues is limited to 15% of fixed seating capacity or 300, whichever is less.
