



THOMAS MURRAY HONORED BY AGO NATIONAL COUNCIL



Celebration of Brilliant Performer, Teacher, and Friend Raised \$30,000 to benefit AGO Endowment Fund

NEW YORK CITY — The American Guild of Organists (AGO) presented its eighth annual Recital and Gala Benefit Reception on Sunday, May 15, at Yale University in New Haven, Conn. An estimated audience of 500 colleagues, students, and friends came together to celebrate the lifetime achievements of Thomas Murray on the occasion of his thirtieth anniversary at Yale.

The gala was sponsored by the AGO National Council and its Development Committee. Major funding was provided by the Yale Institute of Sacred Music and Pemcor Inc. of Lancaster, Pa., printer of The American Organist. The event raised \$30,000 to be invested in the AGO Endowment Fund in Thomas Murray's honor.

The recital, which was played by Thomas Murray on the world renowned Newberry Memorial Organ in Woolsey Hall, was introduced by Craig Whitney, New York Times assistant managing editor (retired) and author of All the Stops: The Glorious Pipe Organ and Its American Masters. Professor Murray's program included Bach's Toccata in F Major (BWV 540), Sonata II (1937) by Hindemith, selections from Symphony I on Gregorian Themes (1932) by Guy Weitz, and the Symphony in D Minor by Franck, transcribed by Calvin Hampton. A reception, which was attended by 125 individuals, followed in the Yale President's Room.

Established in 1994, the AGO Endowment Fund provides income to expand programs for leadership development among AGO members; educate new organists; and cultivate new audiences for organ and choral music. Tax-deductible contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested in perpetuity to produce continuing income support for essential Guild programs and educational projects.

AGO NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON ORGAN PEDAGOGY

NEW YORK CITY – The American Guild of Organists (AGO) and the Eastman School of Music are partnering to produce the 16th biennial AGO National Conference on Organ Pedagogy, November 10–13, 2011, in Rochester, N.Y. The conference, designed in cooperation between the AGO Committee on Continuing Professional Education and the 10th annual Eastman Rochester Organ Initiative (EROI) Festival, will present the topic of organ improvisation through a variety of compositional techniques and styles. Complete information, including online registration, is available on the AGO website. Early registration discounts are available through August 15.

"The goal of the AGO's pedagogy conferences is to address various topics and issues pertaining to organ instruction in North America," declared David Heller, director of the AGO Committee on Continuing Professional Education. "The City of Rochester and the Eastman School of Music, with its multiplicity of instruments and performing venues, will provide a superb setting in which to address the topic of improvisation from many different angles, providing information and resources that will be useful to all instructors of the organ at all levels of instruction."

The four-day conference will present master classes featuring students at a variety of levels, panel discussions addressing the teaching of improvisation, and sessions that will provide attendees with resource material in the pedagogy of improvisation. The keynote address, Why Is Improvisation So Difficult?, will be given by Eastman faculty member William Porter.

A distinguished faculty of internationally renowned organists and teachers working in the discipline of organ improvisation will include Jeffrey Brillhart (Yale University), Tony Caramia (Eastman), Sophie-Veronique Cauchefer-Choplin (Royal College of Music, London), Hans Davidsson (Eastman), Michael Dodds (University of North Carolina School of the Arts), Gerre Hancock (Butler School of Music, University of Texas), David Higgs (Eastman), Denise Lanning (Denver Chapter, AGO), Rudolf Lutz (Schola Cantorum Basiliensis), William Marvin (Eastman), Bruce Neswick (Indiana University), David Peckham (Horseheads United Methodist Church, Horseheads, N.Y.), McNeil Robinson (Manhattan School of Music), Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra (author of Bach and the Art of Improvisation), John R. Shannon (Sweet Briar College), and Daniel Zager (Eastman).

I love the metropolis of Chicagoland and the treasure trove of Pipe Organs that it contains! Nothing gives me more pleasure than hearing them and singing with them surrounded by my colleague friends. I am writing today to ask of you a favor. I am chair of the Organ Historical Society

National Convention which will be held here in Chicago in July of 2012. First, I sincerely hope <u>you will join us</u> at the convention! Second, might I ask you to <u>each invite one friend</u> to join us from July 8 to 13 here in Chicago? What will be offered? Let me entice you!

We will hear two magnificently restored E. M. Skinners; one at First Methodist in Oak Park, played by the amazing Ken Cowan, and the second at the Music Institute in Chicago in Evanston. We will hear area native Nathan Laube play at the heroic Rockefeller Memorial Chapel, and also hear the Fisk at St. Chrysostom's in Chicago. We will see stunning venues like North Shore Congregation Israel, Emmanuel Episcopal in La Grange and Divine Word Chapel in Techny with its unique, literally, Wiener organ. Chicago treasure David Schrader will perform a pops concert at Orchestra Hall, and we will have an opportunity to hear the Estey Organ with its "cash register" console in the opulent environs of the American College of Surgeons. We will end the week traveling to Jasper Sanfilippo's stunning home for a concert on the world's largest Theater Organ!

We will also hear a magnum opus of Richard O. Whitelegg, the Tonal Director of the Möller Organ Company, the 1935 four-manual instrument in Carl Schurz High School. If you do not know this instrument, it is in an award-winning Prarie-Style building on the National Register of Historic Places, has an auditorium that seats 1,800, with three seconds of reverberation time, and the organ boasts a four-rank Fourniture, a five-rank Cornet and a four-rank Harmonics stop (complete with Septième!) on the Great alone! Speaking of very special organs, we will see the beautifully restored Hook & Hastings at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Valparaiso and a very rare and late three-manual Hinners (yes, an Illinois builder!) as well.

We will hear the oldest organ in the city of Chicago; as well as an organ that was played each Sunday by Paul Manz. A remarkably pristine Kimball organ, built right here in Chicago, will be heard as well in the First Church of Christ, Scientist in Winnetka. We will also hear new organs by Pasi, Buzard, Berghaus and others. For our guests from around the country, we will feature some of our finest local players including Wolfgang Rübsam, John Sherer, Cathryn Wilkinson, Stephen Schnurr, Derek Nickels, Elizabeth Naegele among many others. We will also have the opportunity to hear young players like the up-and-coming Nicholas Bideler, Adam Gruber and Madeleine Woodworth. Each organist will demonstrate the unique colors and potential of each instrument.

Ypsilanti Pipe Organ Festival proudly presents organist and conductor James Hammann. Dr. Hammann will perform music by American Romantic composers Dudley Buck, James H. Rogers, James Houston Spencer, Felix Borowski and Horatio Parker who were active during the second half of the nineteenth and first part of the twentieth centuries writing in the Romantic idiom. With the exception of Parker these composers were residents of cities around the Great Lakes and all were active at the time the Jardine Organ at First Presbyterian Church Ypsilanti was built.

After 20 years with the University of New Orleans Hammann has recently retired from his position as Co-Chairman of the Music Department. He now resides in Iowa Falls, Iowa, where he is the proud owner of an historic Lustron home. Dr. Hammann holds degrees in organ performance and church music from Ohio Wesleyan University and The University of Michigan. His teachers include Rexford Keller, Robert Clark and Marilyn Mason. Hammann has performed throughout the United States. He has given over one hundred performances of his one man show "Old Bach." His conducting credits include stints with Chapel of the Holy Comforter, New Orleans, The New Orleans Civic Symphony, The Allen Park Symphony and the Southeastern Michigan Choral Society. His five CD's of organ music recorded on historic instruments in Germany and the United States have won rave reviews. His recently released CD "Dudley Buck Organ Music" was performed on the 1866 E. & G. G. Hook organ at St. John's Episcopal Church, Quincy, Illinois.

The first titled *Christ Be Our Light* has 9 hymn tune-based arrangements, and 3 original compositions. The second collection just came out this summer and is shared with many other composers titled *In Heaven Above*. Sally has three arrangements in this overall collection of 75 piano selections - *Be Not Afraid*, *Prayer of St. Francis*, and an original piece written for Alice Smallman, *Resting In His Arms*. Some of the published music will be performed at the Benefit Concert in October. The music will be available for purchase at the concert with half of the proceeds going to the Haitian ministry.



Diane Bish is the most visible and influential classical organist performing today. Concert and recording artist, composer, conductor, and international television personality, Diane Bish displays her dazzling virtuosity and unique showmanship the world over to international acclaim. Her organ performances are hailed as "stunning, virtuoso, fiery, and astonishing."

Miss Bish's unparalleled achievements as a young performer gave her the credibility and determination to launch The Joy of Music international television series in 1982 as a platform for awareness and appreciation of "the king of instruments." Broadcast to over 300 million people around the world each week, The Joy of Music combines exhilarating organ and ensemble performances with an informative, inspirational narrative and exciting world travel. The Joy of Music boasts over 500 episodes featuring famous cathedrals, concert halls, churches and organs. This tremendous outreach to the general public on behalf of the organ and Diane Bish's longevity as a leading recitalist distinguishes her in the world of music.

In 1989, Miss Bish was awarded the National Citation by the National Federation of Music Clubs of America. Considered to be the Federation's highest honor, Diane Bish shares this rare distinction with such legends as Leonard Bernstein, Eugene Ormandy, Van Cliburn, Robert Shaw, Irving Berlin and Fred Waring in receiving this award "for distinguished service to the musical, artistic, and cultural life of the nation."

A consummate church musician, Diane Bish served as senior organist and artist-in-residence at the Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, for over 20 years. While at Coral Ridge Church, she led the design of the 117-rank Ruffatti organ, distinguished as one of the great organs in America. She was instrumental in developing one of the country's first church concert series and creating an annual church music workshop for musicians around the world. In her book Church Music Explosion, Miss Bish shares her philosophy of excellence in church music.

Miss Bish has recorded on the foremost organs of the world and was the first American woman to record on the four organs of Freiburg Cathedral, Germany. Featured on over 30 of her recordings are music for organ and orchestra, brass and organ, great organ masterpieces, organ and harp, original works, and hymn arrangements.

The sparkling creativity and artistry of Diane Bish is equally evident in her compositions. She has composed numerous solo pieces, arrangements, and full symphonic works that have received much acclaim and are performed regularly due to her ability to combine musical quality with accessibility.

Her list of creative projects also includes the Diane Bish Signature Series by Allen line of digital organs. Working closely with the technicians and designers at Allen Organ Company, Miss Bish beautifully combined her musical vision and expertise with the superior technical design of the Allen Organ. Many Diane Bish Signature Series Organs have been installed around the country and are available through the Allen Organ Company.

Diane Bish began her study with Dorothy Addy in Wichita, Kansas, and continued as a student of Mildred Andrews. She was a recipient of Fulbright and French government grants for study in Amsterdam and Paris with Nadia Boulanger, Gustav Leonhardt and Marie Claire Alain. <u>Diane Bish: First Lady of the Organ</u> by Warren Woodruff was published in 1993. Diane Bish is represented worldwide by JEJ Artists.
